The Kano State Agro-pastoral Development Project is a \$95 million, 5-year program which focuses on improving crop production and enhancing livestock productivity in the state. It is funded by the Islamic Development Bank, IsDB, the Lives and Livelihood Funds, LLF and the government of Kano state. The Executing Agency of the program is the Kano State Agriculture and Rural Development Authority (KNARDA).

The overall objective of the KSADP is to contribute to reducing poverty and strengthening food and nutrition security in the state by developing agro-pastoral production systems (production, processing, and retailing). The target beneficiaries of the program include smallholder farmers and pastoralists.

Other key beneficiaries are actors involved in the value chain of agro-pastoralism, namely, agricultural produce processors, marketers, input suppliers, and financial

institutions. The program will directly benefit over 1.26 million people.

One of our major mandates is the development of the crop value chain. In this regard, we are funding Sasakawa Africa Association (SAA) to impact nearly half a million smallholder farmers across the 44 local government areas of Kano. We are proud that our relationship with SAA is making a huge impact.

It is my hope that this publication will bring into the limelight the achievements of our collaboration with SAA and how, together, we can continue to make an impact in agriculture for the good of our citizens.

Sasakawa, IsDB, pledge support to states to replicate Kano's Agropastoral project

The Sasakawa Africa Association (SAA) and the Islamic Development Bank (IsDB) have offered to support Nigerian state governments interested in replicating the Kano State Agropastoral Development Project (KSADP). The assurance came at a two-day high-level workshop organised in Kano by the SAA in collaboration with the IsDB and the Kano State Government on October 7 and 8 2024.

Themed, Agricultural Transformation and What Works: Reflections from the Crop Value Chain of the Kano State Agropastoral Development Project (KSADP), the event which was chaired by former Nigerian President, Chief Olusegun Obasanjo represented by his Special Assistant, Mr Vitalis Ortese, highlighted the achievements of the KSADP, and provided an avenue for the participants to network, and understand the KSADP model. They also explored options for IsDB financing in the agricultural sector in their various states. Participants included

Commissioners of Agriculture from different states of the federation, stakeholders, IsDB representatives from Jiddah and 5 African Countries, of as well as representatives of international development agencies and key private sector players

Speaking after a field trip to some KSADP/SAA project locations where they interacted with beneficiaries, the participants Agriculture commissioners, and representatives of the government of Gombe, Jigawa, Katsina and Benue, expressed awe at how much the KSADP had transformed agriculture in Kano State. They conveyed their state's willingness to replicate the same in their states which are among the major agriculture hubs in the country.

The Kano State governor, Engr Abba Kabir Yusuf, who was represented by his deputy, Alhaji Aminu Gwarzo, stated that due to its seamless integration with small business development initiatives, the KSADP had been a springboard

for developments in other sectors in the state including the development of micro, small and medium scale enterprises. He assured that the state will also be ready to partner with those interested in borrowing a leaf from the KSADP.

Assuring that the IsDB was always ready to support state governments to achieve their agriculture development objectives, Dr Nizar Zaied, Head of Agriculture, Water Resources and Rural Development at IsDB stated that the international lender has always financed development projects in Nigeria and will continue to do so for the

country, which is a major shareholder in the bank.

Noting that the bank had invested up to \$2.1 billion in financing different financial products in Nigeria, Zaied said: “One of the most recent approvals was in March 2024, for the Abia State Integrated Infrastructure”

The Board Chairman of the SAA, Dr Amit Roy, appreciated the IsDB, the Kano State Government and other partners working with SAA, saying that “the success of the KSADP is a testament to the partnership and what strong collaborations can achieve ●

How KSADP transformed Kano's livestock, crop value chain, in 3 years

During their presentations at the High-level workshop held recently Kano, the KSADP State Project Coordinator, Ibrahim Garba Muhammad, and the KSADP/SAA Project Coordinator, Abdulrasheed Kofarmata, highlighted some of the achievements of the project in the last three years. The presentations showed that more than half a million farmers and their families have been reached and

positively impacted along various value chain activities under the project out of which 263,233 have been trained in livestock and crop value chains.

Speaking on the achievements in livestock and infrastructural development, Mohammed disclosed that more than 4.5million livestock have been vaccinated which led to the saving of N559,810,512 that could have been lost through mortality.

His words: “The project constructed 40 milk collection centres and upgraded the biggest milk and fura da nono market in the state to the modern standard. Additionally, we distributed 1,500 bulls, 6,250 rams and 12,000 goats for fattening and reproduction. Five big cattle markets have been renovated and upgraded and 20 slaughterhouses provided with modern drying and hanging material and solar-powered systems.

“In the area of infrastructural development, the repairs and expansion of water irrigation scheme of up to 9.5km in water canals have led to an increase in number of rice processing cottages and the opening of over 1,000 ha of irrigable land.”

In his presentation, Kofarmata indicated that the crop value chain development component of the project has hastened the pace at which farmers were moving towards mechanization. According to him, “We have supported more than 10,000 farmers with inputs,

labour-saving equipment, including 20 power tillers, 540 planters, 401 USG applicators, 1,300 water pumps. To promote climate-smart, yield enhancing and Regenerative Agriculture practices, we established as many 5,348 demonstration clusters and 1,237 hectares of Community Based Seed Multiplication (CBSM) plots. Though this CBSM initiative, quality seeds of improved varieties have been made available across the project communities where 596.3mt of rice, 533.4mt of maize, 104.6mt of sorghum and 166.4mt of millet improved seeds have been produced by farmers under the guidance of project technical team. These efforts have led to massive yield increases from 1.5mt to 5.1mt for rice, 1.3mt to 4.2mt for maize, 0.9mt to 2.4mt for millet and 1.03mt to 2.6mt for sorghum.”

Kofarmata also explained that “to reduce post-harvest losses and support processing activities, we established 54 processing centres, 64 threshing clusters, 23 onion storage facilities, and three solar-powered parabolic

tent dryers. Targeting women, we established three medium-scale rice parboiling enterprises and 3 tomato processing centres’.

He said further: “Our capacity building efforts have reached almost half a million famers. In terms of direct training and empowerment, we have trained and empowered 80 indigenous machine fabricators, 250 machine operators, 370 agro-input stockists, 1,465 contract sprayers and created 3,962 indirect jobs along the value chains. We were able to facilitate over \$300,000 in access to finance for groups through our market-oriented agriculture component. We trained 854 extension agents, community based facilitators and Commodity Association Traders (CATS). We procured and distributed 220 motorcycles to aid the mobility of our extension agents.”

The project leaders noted that the project had provided

scholarship and supported 115 students of Kano State in various degrees and diplomas as follows: National Diploma, 50 students; Higher National Diploma, 50 students; Master of science degree, 10 students and Doctorate degrees, five students ●

"Kano is a shining example of a state determined to boost food security, transform the lives of its populace and help farmers navigate the challenges of climate change through massive investments bagged by political will. The field trip we shall embark upon will buttress these points."

Those were the words of the Country Director of SAA Nigeria, Dr Godwin Atser, while welcoming participants to the KSADP high-level workshop in Kano recently. The participants were mostly commissioners and heads of agriculture agencies from various states and organisations.

So, on Day 2 of the workshop, October 8, 2024, the participants, led by the SAA board members and KSADP project leaders, took a tour of the project fields. The team visited Kura Local Government where the project established rice demonstration plots to promote regenerative agriculture practices and

engendered adoption in the community; and a rice parboiling centre established for a women's group. An area where a chain of agro-input stockists was set up to promote adequate sales, display and availability of agro-inputs was also visited.

The tour also took participants to Chiromawa where they experienced the community-based seed multiplication plot for maize, an initiative helping to diffuse improved seeds for higher yield and climate adaptation, across farming communities. An Onion storage centre using the Artificially Aerated Onion Storage Technology (AAOST) established by the project in several communities was also visited in Chiromawa as well as the workshop of one of the indigenous agricultural machine operators trained and empowered by the project.

During the tour, participants interacted with the beneficiaries and listened to their success stories as well as their plans as a result of the intervention in their

communities. During an experience-sharing session after the trip, participants, in various speeches, indicated that the project had demonstrated strong promotion of rural extension, local content, empowerment of vulnerable populations, job creation, improved seed diffusion, community ownership, post-harvest loss reduction, and technology adoption.

Commenting on the areas of interest identified by the participants, SAA President, Dr Matoko Kitanaka noted that “in the context of climate change, SAA will continue to listen to the voices of the farmers especially as it concerns balancing the environment with agricultural productivity in relationship to population, job creation and gender inclusiveness. We plan to leverage the latest

trends in a digital era to expand interventions across the communities.

While closing the experience-sharing session, Dr Atser commended the states willing to replicate the KSADP, saying that he was congratulating them in advance.

His words: “Agriculture is the only way to banish hunger and poverty from our nation. So, I urge you to be motivated by what you saw on the field today and take advantage of the various agricultural financing options the IsDB is showcasing. You have seen it happening in Kano. It can happen in your state even at a greater scale. Sasakawa will be there to support you,” he told participants ●

Gombe, Jigawa, sign MoU to renew relationship with Sasakawa at KSADP workshop

After experiencing the tremendous crop value chain developments facilitated under the Kano State Agropastoral Development Project (KSADP), by the Sasakawa Africa Association, the governments of Gombe and Jigawa States renewed their decade-long partnership with the organization, pledging to continue working for agricultural development activities in their states.

The Memoranda of Understanding (MoU) were signed by the Commissioners of Agriculture of the two states at the High-level workshop held in Kano. While Gombe State signed at a dinner held as part of the workshop on October 7, Jigawa signed on October 8, after joining participants of the workshop on a field tour of KSADP sites.

Speaking at the signing of the MoUs, immediate past SAA Nigeria Country Director, Prof. Sani Miko, noted that Jigawa had been a partner of SAA since 1992. “Jigawa has been very supportive, bringing 30% of the funding for SAA activities in the state. That is a good sign of commitment to agricultural transformation in the state.

According to Dr Mel Olouch, the head of the SAA’s Strategic Partnerships Office, one of the important

works of SAA in the Jigawa state is soil regeneration through Regenerative Agriculture practices. Thanking the commissioner for his hard work, Dr Olouch said, “This MoU will strengthen partnership to ensure we get more resources to improve the livelihoods of farmers in Jigawa state”.

In his response, the Jigawa State Commissioner for Agriculture, Alhaji Muttaka Namadi, congratulated SAA on its achievements under the KSADP, saying “These achievements need to be replicated in Jigawa state, especially with what I am seeing on the ground today.

While signing the MoU at a dinner on October 7, the Gombe State Commissioner for Agriculture, Animal Husbandry, and Cooperatives, Dr. Barnabas Malle, said the governor was already commenced the official processes to replicate the KSADP model in the state.

“Our working relationship with Sasakwa started more than 10 years ago, so we know the capacity of SAA and how much the state can benefit from working with the organisation. So, I want to assure you that His Excellency, Governor, Alhaji Mohammed Inuwa Yahaya, is very grateful for this partnership”●

Kano governor flags off of mechanization support

...as project distributes combine harvesters, Hijet vehicles, solar-powered pumps, hermetic storage drums, others

The Kano State Governor, Engr Abba Kabir Yusuf, flagged off a massive mechanization support to farmers in the state on October 7 2024 as part of the KSADP high-level workshop held in the state. The initiative included the distribution of farm machines and equipment to farmers under the crop value chain component of the KSADP being implemented by SAA.

Equipment distributed included 12 combine harvesters, 10 Hijet vehicles, 1,565 solar-powered knapsack sprayers, 556 solar-powered water pumps, metal work and welding kits, and other essential farm tools and implements.

Speaking just before flagging off the exercise, Governor Yusuf, who was represented by his deputy, Comrade Aminu Abdulsalam Gwarzo, urged beneficiaries

to make good use of the equipment to boost yield and productivity and ensure that it benefits their communities. The event provided an opportunity to commence the empowerment of local fabricators trained in August at the National Centre for Agricultural Mechanization (NCAM), Idofian, Kwara State. Five of them who attended the event received metalwork and welding kits.

Sagir Abubakar, a representative of the Ashirawa B rice farmer group from G/Mallam LGA, who received a combined harvester thanked the project and stated that the equipment will create miles of difference in farming.

He said: "One of the challenges we used to face is lack of machines to make work faster, easier and cleaner. These equipment are going to change the stories of farmers

in the state. My group is very thankful for the combine harvester we are receiving today. I want to assure KSADP, IsDB, LLF, Sasakawa and our good governor that we will maximize the use of these machines and contribute massively to boosting food production in our state.”

Habiba Muhammad, who received a Hijet vehicle, could not hold back her joy. She prayed for the funders and executors of the project, saying “May Allah bless you beyond your imagination”

Speaking earlier, Abdulrasheed Kofarmata, KSADP Project Coordinator for SAA, stated that the project’s mechanization initiative was aimed at fostering innovation and resilience in agriculture through the use of technology, reducing drudgery and making agriculture attractive for young people.

In a related development, the project distributed 210 units of specially designed hermetic storage drums across the 44 Local Government Areas (LGAs) of Kano State. The 200 kg storage capacity drums offers

better storage conditions for farmers. The drums were produced by the Nigerian Stored Products Research Institute (NISPRI) in Ilorin, Kwara State, are specifically designed to foster better storage conditions for farmers. By providing these drums, the KSADP.

According to Kofarmata, the distribution was part of the projects efforts to tackle the pressing issue of post-harvest losses in cereal crops. “Our goal is to empower farmers with the right tools and knowledge to preserve their produce, thereby enhancing their economic stability and ensuring food security in the region,” he stated.

During the distribution in Kadawa Zone, Mallama Zainab Ahmed, who spoke on behalf of the beneficiaries, said farmers needed such facilities to secure their harvest. She disclosed that they have been trained on the proper use of the drums, promising to follow the steps for optimal use ●

KSADP empowers 88 Lead EAs, CATs with business development skills

The Kano State Agropastoral Development Project (KSADP) recently trained 44 Lead extension agents on business plan development and implementation. The three-day training held from October 23 to 25, 2024 at the Technology Incubation Centre, Farm Centre Kano. The participants were drawn from the 44 Local Government Areas (LGAs) in Kano State.

During the opening ceremony, the KSADP/SAA project coordinator, Abdurashed Kofarmata, advised the participants, to continuously engage with the instructors to refine their entrepreneurial skills. "This training is not just about learning; it's about transforming your potential into success," he advised.

The training program featured various practical sessions, where participants were split into groups to create and present their business plans. This fostered

teamwork and emphasized the significance of mutual support in business development. By working together, the trainees learned valuable strategies for enhancing their agricultural ventures.

Mallam Saadu Abba Salisu, the Lead Extension Agent from Kura LGA, expressed his gratitude for the training and its relevance to his work. He applauded the Sasakawa Africa Association (SAA) for the initiative, saying, "This training has equipped me with essential skills that I will pass on to the farmers in my community."

Dr. Nasiru Umar, the Program Officer for Market Oriented Agriculture, under whose component, the training was organised, said that training extension agents in business was akin to training farmers because "the entrepreneurial mindset of the extension agents will rub off on the farmers they engage with and this is a plus to the promotion of agribusiness" ●

The training, which focused on providing essential skills improved post-harvest technologies, effective marketing strategies, and practical skills vital for running successful agribusinesses, took place at the ICRISAT conference hall in Kano.

Notable personalities in attendance during the closing

ceremony included Dr Danjuma Mahmoud, the State Commissioner for Agriculture and Natural Resources; Dr Farouk Kurawa, Managing Director of the Kano State Agricultural and Rural Development Authority (KNARDA); Mallam Ibrahim Garba Mohammed, the State Project Coordinator for KSADP and Mr Abdurashed Kofarmata, KSADP/SAA Project Coordinator.

Alhaji Inuwa Yahaya, who represented the Commissioner of Agriculture, highlighted the government's support for the empowerment program. "This initiative is commendable and aligns with our

In his speech, the KSADP/SAA Project Coordinator, Abdulrasheed Kofarmata, commended the role being played by ICRISAT as Sasakawa’s partner on the KSADP and urged beneficiaries to make the most of the equipment provided during the training, emphasizing its potential to uplift their communities.

Beneficiaries of the training expressed their gratitude and optimism regarding the opportunities ahead. Fatima Ado, a young entrepreneur, remarked, “This training has equipped me with vital knowledge and skills that I will use to improve my food processing business. I am especially thankful for the starter pack, as it provides the tools, I need to begin my business.”

Similarly, Abubakar Bello, another participant, shared his appreciation for the training: “The insights I gained from the sessions on marketing and post-harvest technologies are invaluable. I feel empowered to turn my ideas into a successful business, and I am grateful for the support from ICRISAT, SAA and the Kano State government ●”
